245. *Please remember!* There are to be NO open fires at the Camporee. **Barbecue grills are NOT ALLOWED** either! If you are caught with an open fire or grill, you will be penalized with a \$999 fine and 180 days in jail from the state of Colorado.

Here is what you can cook on: Coleman stove, propane or butane stove.

The month of August is especially dry in Colorado and we cannot run the risk of setting our Camporee on fire.

246. Don't forget! Please bring a fire extinguisher with you. Although there are **no fires** at the Camporee, accidents do happen! Let's be prepared (especially if you are not taking public transportation to the Camporee)!

247. If you know of anyone that is planning on "sneaking" into the Camporee without any type of ticket, please **strongly** advise them not too. For your protection, all those found on-site without a \$95 wristband or the appropriate day-pass wristband, will have a **police** escort off-site. They will not be permitted the chance to even buy the appropriate day-pass.

248. Guess what? *Pathfinder Names* will have a vendor's booth at the Camporee and they'll be selling **historic Russian pins!!!**

249. The Dare to Care Camporee will have a room in the "tower" (the four-story building on the Campgrounds) that is set aside especially for prayer (room #402). If your Pathfinder is going to be baptized, this might be a place they can go to prepare. Or maybe one of your Pathfinders is going through a tough time at home, or maybe you need to be alone for some strength and for some time to lift your Pathfinders up to the Lord: this is the place!

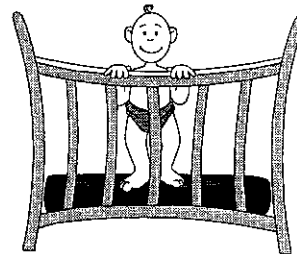

THE MILE LONG HOT DOG

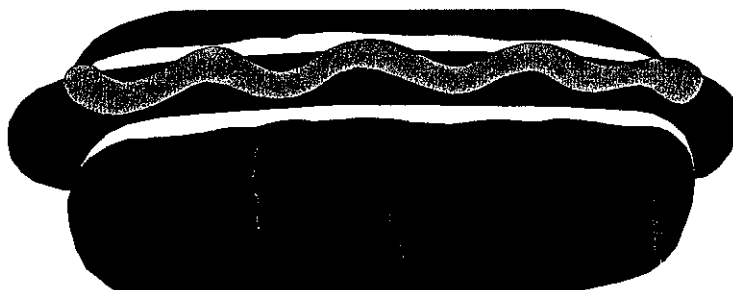
On Thursday, August 4, our theme for the day is "Dare to Care About Mind and Body".

NEWS FLASH

THIS JUST IN . . .

(Please read over carefully as this is brand new information as decided by security and the usher committee!)

⇒ Don't plan on saving any seats at Red Rocks! If 5,000 people show up on the first 75 shuttles (that's 5,000 people) then all the seats will be gone or saved.

⇒ Your drop off point (from the shuttle) may vary each evening (the Amphitheatre has three entrances), so locating your group will be difficult, if you try to save seats.

⇒ Each evening, seating will occur from various points (the entrances) around the Amphitheatre. Ushers will eat you so that space is used effectively.

⇒ The ushers will be dressed in white tops and dark slacks, with Camporee badges and purple ribbons.

⇒ Please follow ushers directions. Security will assist the ushers in seating people.

Points to ponder:

→ Pre-show and Post-show are **exactly** alike. You won't miss anything at Post-show if you already saw Pre-show.

→ Don't forget to bring drinking water. There are no drinking fountains at Red Rocks.

→ Be sure to bring water, sunglasses and a hat on Sabbath morning to help you keep cool.

The Rumor Mill vs. the Real Story

Rumor: The Camporee is sponsoring activities that are considered un-safe.

Real Story: WRONG! The Camporee has been thoroughly inspected by GenCon, the Seventh-day Adventist Church insurance company. They've told us that they have never seen a church sponsored event so tightly organized (this includes our area of safety as well!). GenCon has strict guidelines for activities, and Dare to Care is following all of them!

Rumor: Only SDA professionals are evaluating the DTC Camporee's structure for organization, safety and finances.

Real Story: As of this date, the DTC Executive Committee has requested the following organizations to evaluate the DTC Camporee:

A. Jefferson County Health Department

Report: They love what we have planned in all of the health/sanitation areas.

B. Consultant who has worked on projects like "World Youth Day", a 200,000 person youth event that was held in Denver last summer.

Report: DTC is "light years ahead of last summer's youth event."

C. A non-SDA emergency evacuation/crisis consultant. His services to us are being paid for by Porter Memorial Hospital.

Report: "You folks are doing this event right!"

D. GC auditing services

Report: The NAD treasurer, Elder George Crumley says, "This Camporee has a good chance for financial success."

Rumor: You can bring your own golf car to the Camporee.

Real Story: You cannot bring your own golf car to the Camporee. The only golf cars allowed on-site are the ones DTC has rented out to youth leaders and those with special needs.

PHOTOGRAPHY, MEDIA, COMMUNICATION AND THE RADIO STATION

(Club directors: some of this just might be on your entrance test!)

- *Photography.* Be aware that attendance at an event such as this means you might be photographed! from time to time you'll notice reporters and photographers serving Adventist and public media. You'll see lots of cameras, including video. Pathfinders might see themselves on the big screen in the evening, in the Camporee souvenir video, or in a newsletter or newspaper article. Avoid staring at cameras! The best chance of being included in reports is to ignore photographers and continue doing what you're doing.
- *Spokespersons.* The Camporee has designated official media spokespersons: Ron Whitehead (DTC director), Gary Barnes, (DTC co-director) and Norm Middag (North American Division Pathfinder specialist). Designated media escorts will accompany *public* reporters at all times. All media inquiries will be fielded by a communication team coordinated by Ed Gallagher, DTC communication director.
- *Comments OK.* Pathfinders and support staff: If a public reporter accompanied by an identified media escort ask you for your comments, feel free to give them! The same naturally applies if an Adventist media representative (with or without an escort) approaches you, and if someone from the on-campus radio station asks you to speak. If you're comfortable answering questions about your experience at DTC, go ahead and speak. If you're not comfortable, just say so.
- *An important exception.* In the case of any emergency, crisis situation, or controversial issue, please refrain from comment and let the designated spokespeople answer reporters' questions. This applies to Pathfinder and adult participants, regardless of the role they play; it will help ensure accurate, timely, and appropriate information.
- *Stories to tell?* Do you have interesting stories to tell about your club, about how you raised funds for your trip to the Camporee, about individual Pathfinder achievements, about means of transportation to the Camporee, or anything else unusual or exceptional? See the form in this newsletter that will make it easy for you to let us know about this ahead of time. Stories may be used on the DTC radio station, in the DTC newspaper, or in public media. If you do not let us know about your stories ahead of time, be sure to let us know as soon as you arrive at the Camporee (much better if we can know ahead of time!).
- *A news release from your home town.* Club directors—let your local news media know about your DTC adventure. See the generic sample release printed in this newsletter. You might want to talk with your local church communication director and make a joint effort to secure favorable attention to your club's trip. Use your own name and phone number as a contact. Beyond this, if your local media would like to call the DTC organization, refer them in the first instance to Ed Gallagher, communication director, at (303) 778-2503.

PHOTOGRAPHY, MEDIA, COMMUNICATION AND THE RADIO STATION *continued . . .*

- *Keeping up to date with information.* You'll find 20 message boards around the camping area that will provide schedules of events and activities, and various other pieces of information. Check these regularly for any updates and changes. Also listen to the on-campus radio station (AM 540) for up-to-the-minute information. The daily newspaper (distributed each morning) will also be a good source of information. There is a public address system that will be used, however this does not reach the entire camping area. All administrators and many support staff will carry two-way radios for easy communication in an emergency.

- *DTC Radio—AM 540.* Jim Feldbush and a group of young volunteers will provide an on-site radio program from 6 am each day until about an hour after the night-time program ends (see enclosed radio program). Some highlights:

- News and information first thing in the morning (6 am), and on the hour every hour through the day.

- A varied format that includes Christian music and interviews with people at the Camporee who have stories to tell.

- Broadcast of the night-time programs on a tape delayed relay system beginning approximately one half hour after the commencement of each program. If, because of illness or commitments, you cannot attend a night-time program, you can still hear it on the radio at the campground area.

- *Important notes about the radio station:*

- Club directors and youth leaders---bring a good radio for use by your group. The radio will be an invaluable source of daily DTC information. (We ask that *only* the DTC station be played during the Camporee.)

- Activity coordinators, booth and concession operators---please also bring a radio and set it up in your area to play the DTC station. This will assist communication with all Pathfinders, especially since the camping area does not have a public address system that reaches everywhere. (Again, we ask that you play *only* the DTC station in your area.)

- Activity coordinators, booth and concession operators---would you like some free advertising? Bring a short typewritten message about your activity, display, product or service, and we'll read it on-air at no cost to you.

- *Announcement policy.* The public address system and radio station can be used for formal, urgent or emergency announcements affecting the operation of the Camporee. In general, personal announcements cannot be made (sorry, we simply cannot ask 10,000 campers if anyone has found your toothbrush!). Requests for urgent or emergency announcements may be brought by club directors and youth leaders. All announcements will be subject to the discretion of the staff manning the public address system and radio station.

No solid axles and weight must not be more than 5 ounces.

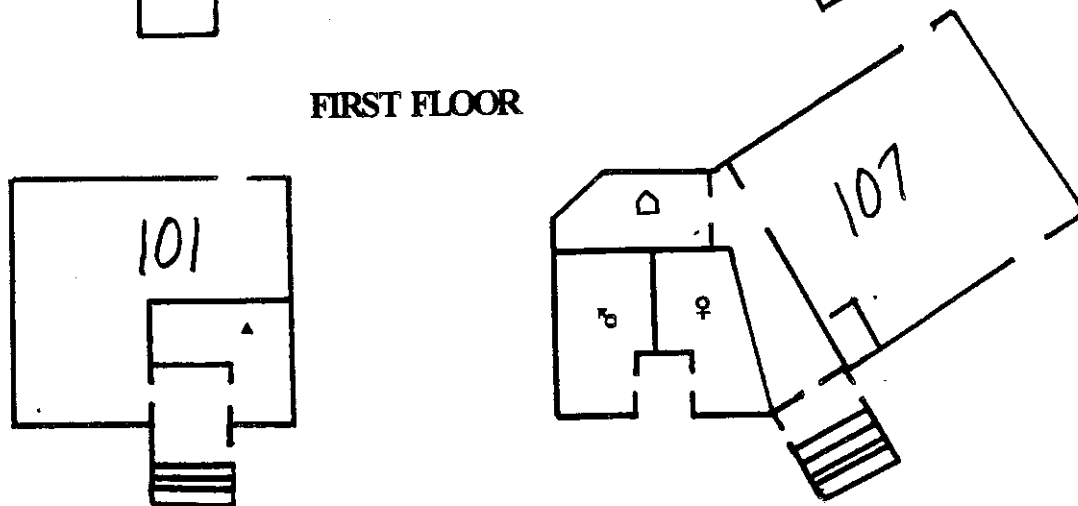

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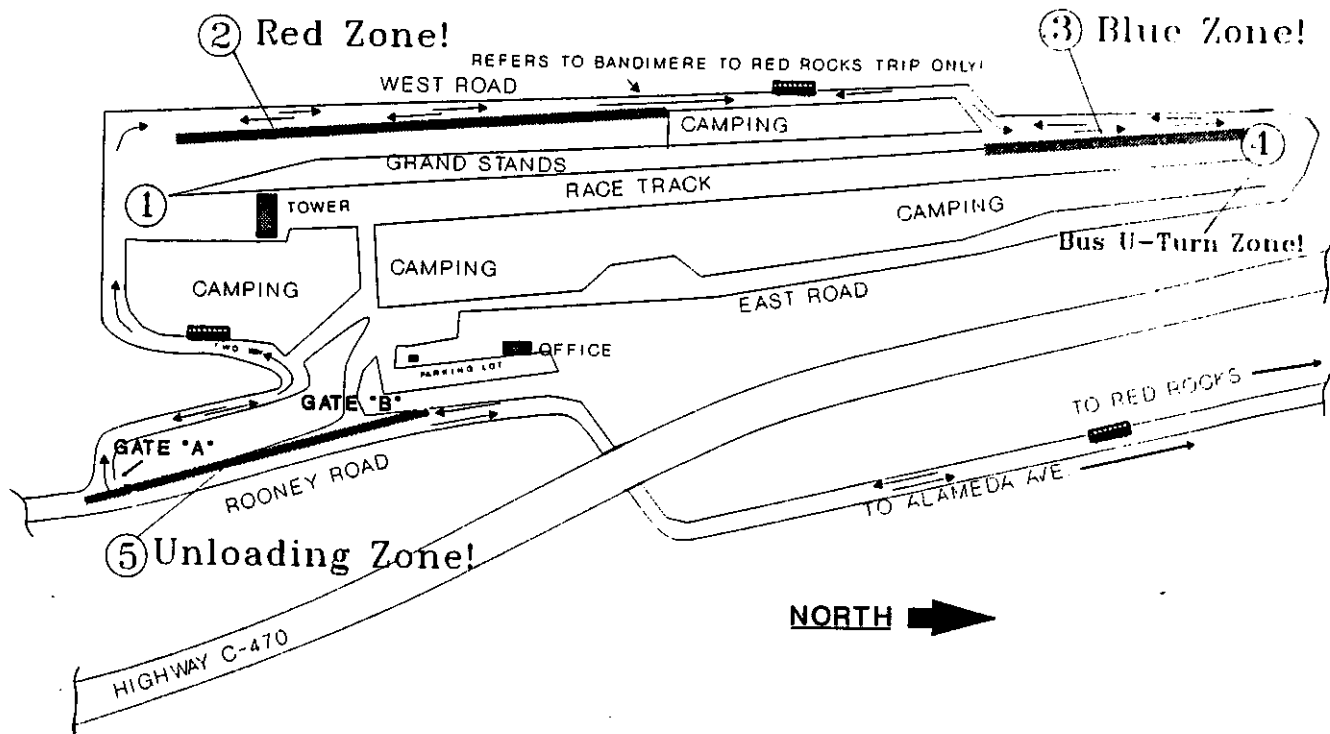

Update on the Shuttle Bus Transportation Plan

(Please refer to the above diagram)

The four main shuttle bus programs are, 1) The Daytime Activity Shuttle, 2) The Community Service Shuttle, 3) The Evening Shuttle to Red Rocks, and 4) Excursion Bus Tours (arranged by individual clubs). The first three shuttle areas are covered in your registration fee.

☛ Please refer to circled item #1 on the diagram above. This is where buses will be loaded and unloaded for the Community Service Shuttle, the Daytime Activity Shuttle, and the Excursion Bus Tours. Several signs will clearly mark each bus stop area to help alleviate confusion. The buses will always enter and exit through gate "A".

☛ Please refer to circled items #2, #3, #4, and #5 on the diagram above. These numbers refer to the Evening Shuttle transportation program ONLY! Please remember that the evening shuttle to Red Rocks Amphitheater will begin promptly at 6:00 pm Tuesday through Saturday and the Saturday morning shuttle to Red Rocks will begin promptly at 9:30 am. Prior to the start of the shuttle, buses marked with a red placard will line up along the #2 Red Zone while buses marked with a blue placard will line up along the #3 Blue Zone. Since the 75 shuttle buses will make two trips, when they return for the second pickup, they will line up according to their color designation. Since 5,000 people will be transported in each trip, 30 minutes will be the maximum amount of time a person will have to wait at a bus stop. On the return trip, the buses will all unload in the #5 unloading zone, and immediately return to Red Rocks for the second pickup.

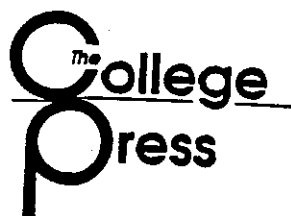

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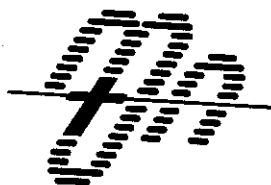
