Directors Bring Joint Expertise to Daniel Production

Sean Dale is director of the Forever Faithful drama production. He currently works as marketing and public relations director for the Adventist University of Health Sciences, and majored in public relations and theater in college.

Sean remembers saying to his wife, "You know, I love theater, and I feel like God is leading me to do something with this, but nothing has ever come to fruition." Two days later, he got a call saying he was being considered for director—by the end of the week, he had the job.

Sean has been doing theater since he was a little kid, but this is his first camporee. That makes him an ideal fit with co-director Heidi Whitehead-Littell, who has been going to camporee for years. "I have my history in theater," he explains, "and she has the deeper understanding that there's going to be cameras, and the props have to be larger than life. Working with Heidi has taught me to think bigger as a director."

Sean has loved working on the play. The cast, he says, "is one of the most fun I've ever worked with...everyone just knows they have a higher calling." When Pathfinders watch the play at Oshkosh he hopes they'll "walk away with the knowledge that a play can be just as effective as a sermon."

Though most of Sean's work is behind the scenes, he will be appearing on stage as Zuban, the taskmaster in Act 5. "There might be some other cameos," he says with a grin. "You just have to seek me out!"

Sean lives in Denver, Colorado, with his wife, Luciana, who will also be appearing in the play as a nurse. He loves playing tennis and racquetball, and critiquing movies. His favorite Bible verse is Ecclesiastes 7:12: "Wisdom is a shelter as money is a shelter, but the advantage of knowledge is this: wisdom preserves those who have it."

Co-director **Heidi Whitehead-Littell** has been involved with camporees for a long time—Ron Whitehead, camporee executive director, is her dad!

Astute listeners may also recognize her as the narrator from Faith on Fire Camporee in 2004.

Heidi's extensive camporee experience means that she's dealt with a lot of the unique aspects of staging a play for tens of thousands of people—outdoors. Some of the challenges include helping the actors perform knowing they will be visible on stage as well as camera, and choosing props—like the 45-foot statue of Nebuchadnezzar!

"Something I really want the kids to get out of this production of the Daniel story is to constantly point people to Jesus," she says. "That's what Daniel's life was about."

When she's not working with Oshkosh, Heidi is the assistant youth director of the Rocky Mountain Conference. She lives in Denver, Colorado, with her husband Kyle, and enjoys hiking, camping and Jeeping. Her favorite Bible verse is Philippians 4:13—"I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

Sam Leonor Jr. is a Puerto-Rican/Dominican born in Puerto Rico and raised as a missionary kid in Nicaragua, Guatemala and Mexico. He spent his childhood traveling with his parents and helping serve others—his favorite memories are of visiting remote villages in Nicaragua to do medical relief work.

When he was little he wanted to be a pilot, but when he went to Southern Adventist University in Collegedale, Tennessee, he studied to be a high school Bible teacher instead. Then he attended the Andrews University Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary in Berrien Springs, Michigan, where he got his Master of Divinity with an emphasis in youth ministry.

Sam is married to Shelley Campbell Leonor, an occupational therapist, and they have two children—Alexandra, 14, and Micah, 11. In his spare time, Sam likes reading, hiking, biking, camping with his family, and "beating my kids at basketball while I still can!"

Sam loves the fact that Pathfinders, at its heart, is about "finding and clearing a path to Jesus. That is the best thing about it." He's excited to be speaking at Oshkosh, because Daniel is his favorite Bible character. His hope for this Camporee is that "those who have not made a commitment to Jesus will do so, that those who have drifted or wandered away from Jesus will recommit to him, and that those who are faithful will be reminded that our greatest joy is found in leading others to Him."

Ultimately, he says, the message he wants to communicate is simple: "God is faithful. Always."

It’s a Bird, It’s a Plane...

While there are far more people than planes this week, Camporee takes place at a large airfield. The most famous plane at the campground is the Pathfinder plane. The official Pathfinder plane is a mission plane cosponsored by the international Pathfinder clubs and Adventist World Aviation in 1999. The Cessna Skylane is a single-engine, four-seat aircraft weighing 1,200 pounds. It can operate out of 1,000 foot airstrips, travel at speeds of up to 170 mph, and has a range of 900 miles. For the last 15 years, it has used to help missionary work in Guyana.

“One of the native pastors told us people would look up,” he explains, “and see the yellow plane and say, ‘there goes the Adventist plane!’”

“The Pathfinders should be proud to think that they had a part in doing that for their church and in helping provide a plane that has done so much good for missions,” says Richard Habenicht, development director of Adventist World Aviation. “It has hauled many medical workers in to serve the people of the jungles and provided transportation and support for our church’s pastors and missionaries in that country. It has hauled tons of supplies. It has transported medicines in to clinics in the jungle and of course it has saved hundreds of lives in flying people out to the hospitals in Georgetown, the capitol.”

Now, however, the Pathfinder plane needs a complete overhaul before it can return to service, this time in the Philip-pines. The North American Division has agreed to provide \$110,000 for reconstruc-tion, but Adventist World Aviation needs your help. Their goal is for every NAD Pathfinder to raise \$5.00 to help put our plane back in the sky!

While the plane is at Camporee, Path-finders will have the opportunity to see it—some may even go for a ride! The flight school at Thunderbird Academy in Scott-sdale, Arizona, will also be leading out in the test phase of a brand new aviation honor.

A second plane will also be on display at Camporee. This plane will be replacing the Pathfinder plane in Guyana. It is going to be painted with the same yellow color scheme as the old plane, Richard says, so that the people of Guyana will recognize it. “One of the native pastors told us people would look up,” he explains, “and see the yellow plane and say, ‘there goes the Adventist plane!’”

“I think this program is wonderful,” he says, “in that it combines something excit-ing like flying with our Church’s mission to serve God’s children in remote areas and to bring the good news of Jesus to them so they can share eternity with us. Kids need to be connected with something that is making a difference, whether it is helping in a food kitchen or being involved in a larger project like sending a plane to serve God in a remote part of the world.”

Gunther the Lion

When Daniel was in the lions’ den, he spent a lot of time face-to-face with lions without being in danger—and now you can too!

Gunther, a 5-year-old male African lion, will be on display for five hours every day this week in a 10’ x 10’ cage. He weighs about 500 pounds, and he keeps up his weight by eating 12–15 pounds of meat a day—that’s the same as 30 steaks, or 19 cans of FriChik! He is very active for a male lion,



and enjoys playing with his “boomer ball” and playing fetch with a large stick.

When he isn’t at Camporee, Gunther lives at Jo-Don Farms, a zoo and animal event center in Franksville, Wisconsin. He lives in a large exhibit with decks he can climb on, and a den. While he is an African lion, Gunther has traveled a lot less than many of the Pathfinders at Camporee—he was born in another facility in Wisconsin!

Vital Information for Drill and Drum Teams

1. All teams need to arrive at the Ford Tent 15 minutes prior to scheduled time to line up for uniform inspection. Clubs not there on time may lose their opportunity to perform.
2. Due to the large number of teams we have this year, we have had to shorten the performance times of the Basic and Adv. Drill Teams to 2 minutes and 3 minutes respectively. If your team feels they cannot complete the required commands in that time please make us aware of that via email. Fancy drill teams and drum corps will still have 8 minutes, however we ask that if you have completed your performance as practiced before the end of the allotted time please do not repeat commands and dismiss your team. All teams will need to enter and exit the demonstration area quickly and smartly. Teams ending significantly before the allotted time “may” receive a bonus.
3. Temperatures can be very warm during the performance, therefore your team should have applied sunscreen prior to coming to the competition and bring plenty of water. There may not be water available at the staging area.
4. Please monitor your team members for heat exhaustion. If a member of your team is in distress, please make the event staff aware so we can assist with emergency medical help if needed.
5. We are not responsible for any lost uniform pieces or drum equipment left at the staging area. All lost and found items will be taken to the Camporee Lost and Found location at the end of the day.
6. Please contact Joel Hutchins, drill and drum event coordinator, immediately if there is an issue with the schedule or you are not finding your club listed and you know you have received a registration confirmation email. 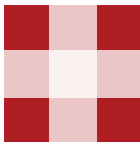

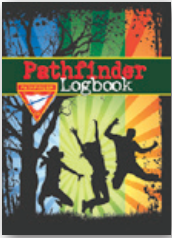
Tips from your Medical Team

1. Please plan on 64 ounces of water each day for each person in your club.
2. Please plan on having Gatorade or equivalent available for each person in your club to drink daily if necessary.
3. Volunteers—if you are coming just to volunteer please make sure you have enough water and electrolyte supplement for yourself as well.
4. Please make sure you plan fiber in your meals at least once daily to help prevent abdominal pain and/or constipation.
5. Please make sure that all adolescent females in your club bring feminine supplies even if they think they won't need them. Our bodies change in large groups and when traveling. Better to be prepared than not.
6. Have Band-Aids, Tylenol and/or Advil at your site for the minor things you might encounter. Please keep medication secured and allow only adults to distribute.
7. **If you have an emergency** that you believe requires 9-1-1, Oshkosh FD Ambulance will be stationed on the grounds from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. and will respond to 9-1-1 calls. They will respond from their Fire Station during other hours of the day.
8. The medical building will be staffed 24/7 to provide care to any person needing medical attention at the Camporee.
9. Medical Team golf carts will be roaming from 8 a.m. to midnight and will be able to respond and manage first aid needs or transport to the medical building if appropriate.
10. Please make sure that everyone in your club, adults and Pathfinders, completes the medical information forms available on the website. It is very important that we have contact information in the event of an emergency. Keep them together in a binder where all adults know where to find them at your location and can get the information to the medical team and/or EMS.
11. Volunteers—please complete the medical information forms as well and have them on your person in the event we need to reference them.
12. Please instruct everyone who is in your club to watch for golf carts and/or the ambulance responding to medical needs and **quickly** move out of the way.
13. Please bring clothing for extreme weather—hot, cold, rain, and humid. The days in central Wisconsin are finally warm but the nights have been cool.
14. Please bring comfortable shoes!! There is a lot of walking on the grounds and you don't want sore feet.
15. When you hear radio traffic that starts with “medical” please do not interrupt the medical relay conversation until the call is completed.

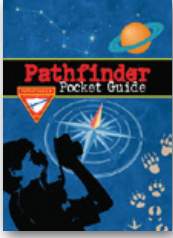

CAMPOREE HYGIENE

General Hygiene

- Wash hands often throughout the day.
- Bring hand-cleaner or wet wipes for use before meals and after use of the portable toilets.
- Sneeze or cough into your shoulder rather than covering your face with a hand.
- Each club, conference, and union is to keep their ground clear of all trash (small or large) at all times.

Toilet Hygiene

- In this country, toilet seats are made to sit on, over the hole or water basin. Paper is used to wipe and put into the toilet. Do not squat on the floor or drop used paper on floor.
- Portable toilets (in rows outside) do not flush. Close the seat when done to keep flies out.
- Toilets in the shower houses must be emptied with water before you leave. Push down on the handle to flush. Always wash your hands at a basin before leaving the bathroom.
- Do not urinate or defecate anywhere other than the toilets. We all want to enjoy camp and leave healthy.

Shower Hygiene

- Showers are made for washing your body.
- Shower for less than five (5) minutes so all get a chance to be clean.
- Never use a shower as a toilet.
- Never use a shower to wash dishes or clothes.

Shower Supervision

- Help keep showers clean by leaving them cleaner than you find them. Cleaning personnel will clean down twice daily.
- To help everyone use showers efficiently, all Pathfinders must be accompanied and supervised by an adult staff to enter the shower facility.
- Any person who is already in line for a shower that needs to use the port-a-let is to be allowed to return to their saved spot. Otherwise, no holding spots or cutting in line.
- Please report any bathroom cleaning concerns to the shower personnel who will be on duty from 6:00 am–midnight at each facility.
- No RV's/camping facilities of any type are to be plugged into any shower facility.

NORMAS DE HIGIENE DEL CAMPOREE

Higiene General

- Lávese las manos durante el día.
- Traiga un desinfectante de manos o líquido antiséptico para usar antes de comer y después de usar los baños públicos.
- Estornude en su hombro en vez de cubrir su boca con su mano.
- Cada club, conferencia/asociación, y unión tiene que mantener su territorio limpio de basura (pequeña o grande) todo el tiempo.

Higiene para el baño

- En este país, los inodoros están diseñados para sentarse sobre la abertura (hueco). El papel higiénico se usa para limpiarse y después se tira en el inodoro. No se agache en el piso o tire papel higiénico usado en el piso.
- Los baños portátiles (en hilera afuera) no tienen manilla/manija para descargar los baños. Cierre la tapa cuando termine para que las moscas no salgan.
- Los inodoros que se encuentran en la casa de baño/duchas se tienen que vaciar con agua antes que se retire. Hay una manija/manilla que tiene que empujar. Siempre lávese las manos en el lavadero antes de salir del baño.
- No orine o defeque en ninguna parte excepto en el inodoro. Todos queremos disfrutar el campamento e irnos saludables.

Higiene de duchas

- Las duchas están diseñadas para lavar el cuerpo.
- Báñese en menos de cinco minutos para dar a todos la oportunidad de estar limpios.
- Nunca use la ducha como si fuera el inodoro.
- Nunca use las duchas para lavar ropa o platos de comer.

Supervisión de las duchas

- Deje la ducha mas limpia de como la encontró. Las personas encargadas limpiarán dos veces al día.

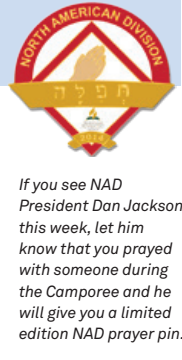

It is the camporee leadership's hearts' desire that this amazing gathering of Pathfinders will be a spiritual hallmark in the lives of each one. Let's pray together as never before for this to happen.

The Shofar at the Forever Faithful Camporee

Purpose

In Daniel's day, the primary purpose of the shofar was not musical but, rather, a means to make an announcement or proclamation.

Jewish tradition tells us that in the Genesis 22:1–14 story of Abraham, when he was asked to offer Isaac as a sacrifice, the ram that God sent provided the first shofar.

According to tradition, Abraham took one of the ram's horns to make the first shofar, and God the other to use at the coming of the Messiah.

While this story is not biblically supported, it is a widely held belief in some Jewish circles.

How We Will Use it

- Each club has received an authentic shofar from Israel. The purpose we will use it for will be to call our Camporee attendees to prayer three times a day like Daniel.
- Each club should select someone to care for the shofar and be prepared to blow it right on time at 10 a.m., noon, and 3 p.m.
- When we hear the Call to Prayer, we want to encourage everyone to stop what he or she is doing for two minutes and find a prayer partner.
- Horn Procedure: Three blasts of two seconds in length, with two-second breaks between blasts.

Worship with your club

To fully explain the use of the shofar and its purpose of timely prayer, an option may be to have

worship with your club leading up to, or in the first few days of the camporee.

There are many biblical references to the shofar in Scripture. In Exodus 9:16, it is used to proclaim the Jubilee Year, and in Numbers 29:1, we see it being used in the Feast of Tabernacles, just to name a few.

Here's a scriptural guide to follow with your Bible study or worship time.

Why the Shofar was Blown in Bible Times

- To gather the people (Exodus 9:16)
- To proclaim liberty (Leviticus 25:1–9)
- To call to war (Judges 3:27)
- To declare victory (1 Samuel 13)
- To announce the coming of the Ark of the Covenant (2 Samuel 6:15)
- To announce the king (I Kings 1:34)
- To give thanks (Numbers 10:10)
- To call to worship (Isaiah 7:13)
- To announce the Lord's return (1 Thessalonians 4:16–17)

- A call to prayer

- Spiritual warfare
- A call to repentance
- As a form of praise
- To divide the enemy

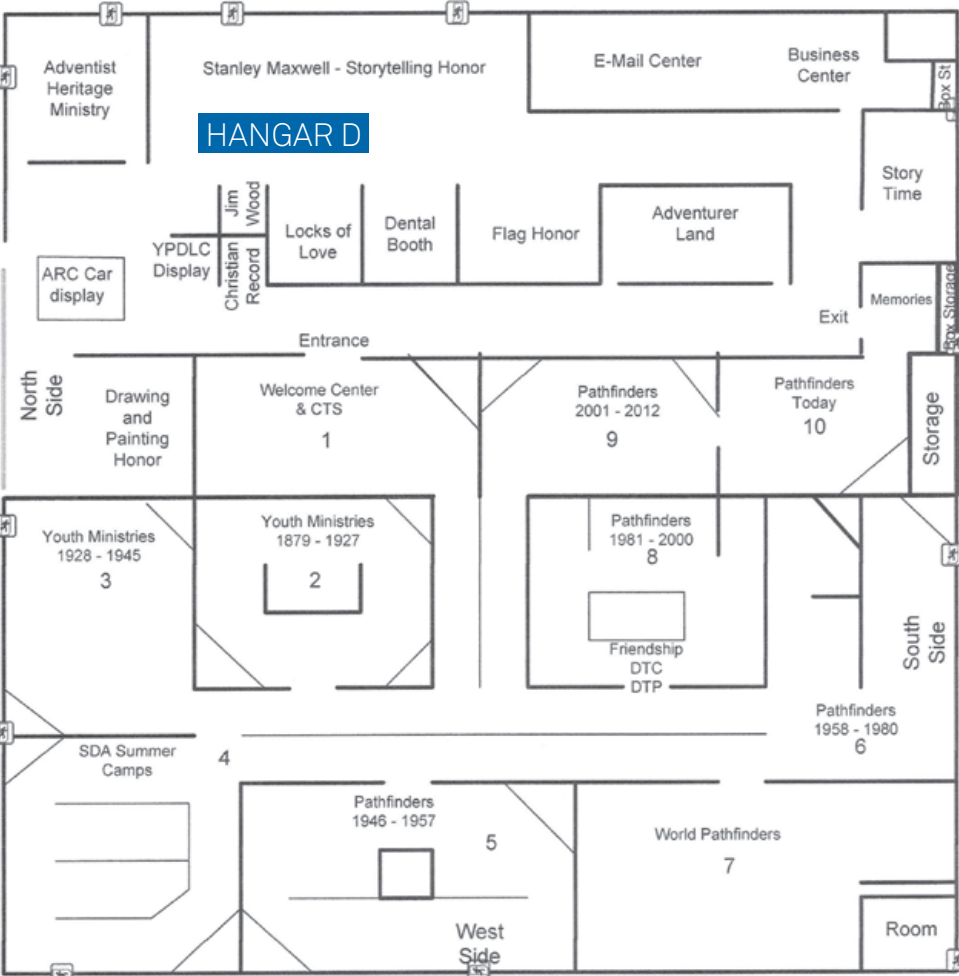

This area holds a surprise gift to those that plan to tour the museum and become involved in each activity. Discover the King who could not speak and learn which youth director had a spinning wheel that he enjoyed using.

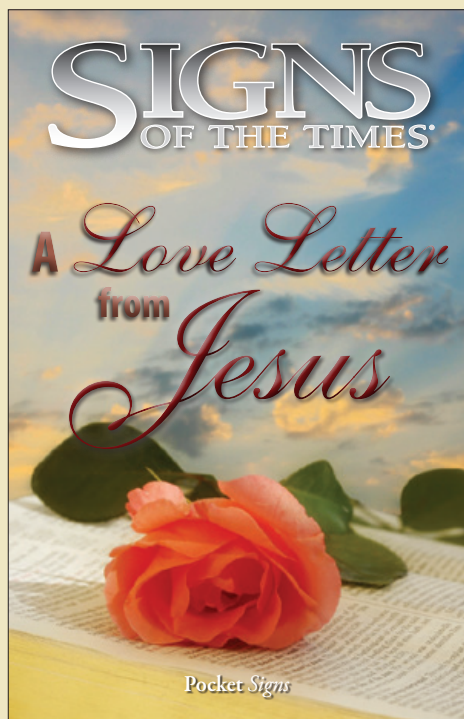

When we sing, "There is power, power, wonder-working power in the blood," we're talking about the blood of Jesus. It's easy to forget, though, that our ordinary human blood has a special power too—the power to help people who are sick or injured.

Blood Drive

On Tuesday, August 12, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., the Community Blood Center will have a self-contained, mobile blood drive unit here at Camporee for the first time. Their goal is to recruit 75 blood donors to help save lives through blood donations. The Blood Drive Bus will be located in front of Hangar C.

For more than 50 years, the Community Blood Center has worked with donors to provide all of the blood used by patients in 18 hospitals in Wisconsin and Michigan. Last year, volunteer donors gave more than 50,000 blood donations to them.

If you want to give blood, you need to be at least 17 years old (or 16 with

parental permission), weigh at least 110 pounds, and be in good general health. While you can donate without signing up, you are encouraged to sign up for an appointment ahead of time, either by calling 800-280-4102 or online at www.save3lives.org (search for sponsor code O189).

The parent/guardian consent form for donors who are 16 years old is available online at www.community-blood.org/resources/16yearolddonorpermisionslip.pdf. If you're too young to donate, don't worry—you can still help out by spreading the word about the blood drive, and helping educate others about the importance of blood donations.

"Blood donations are extremely important," says Liz Wockenfus, who works for the Community Blood Center, "because there is no substitute for human blood—it cannot be manufactured in hospitals or transfused from other animals. Hospital patients in need of transfusion are relying on the generosity of volunteer blood donors."

DID YOU KNOW?

- Every 2 seconds someone needs blood
- 4.5 million Americans will need a blood transfusion each year
- About 1 in 7 people entering a hospital need blood
- One pint of blood can save up to 3 lives

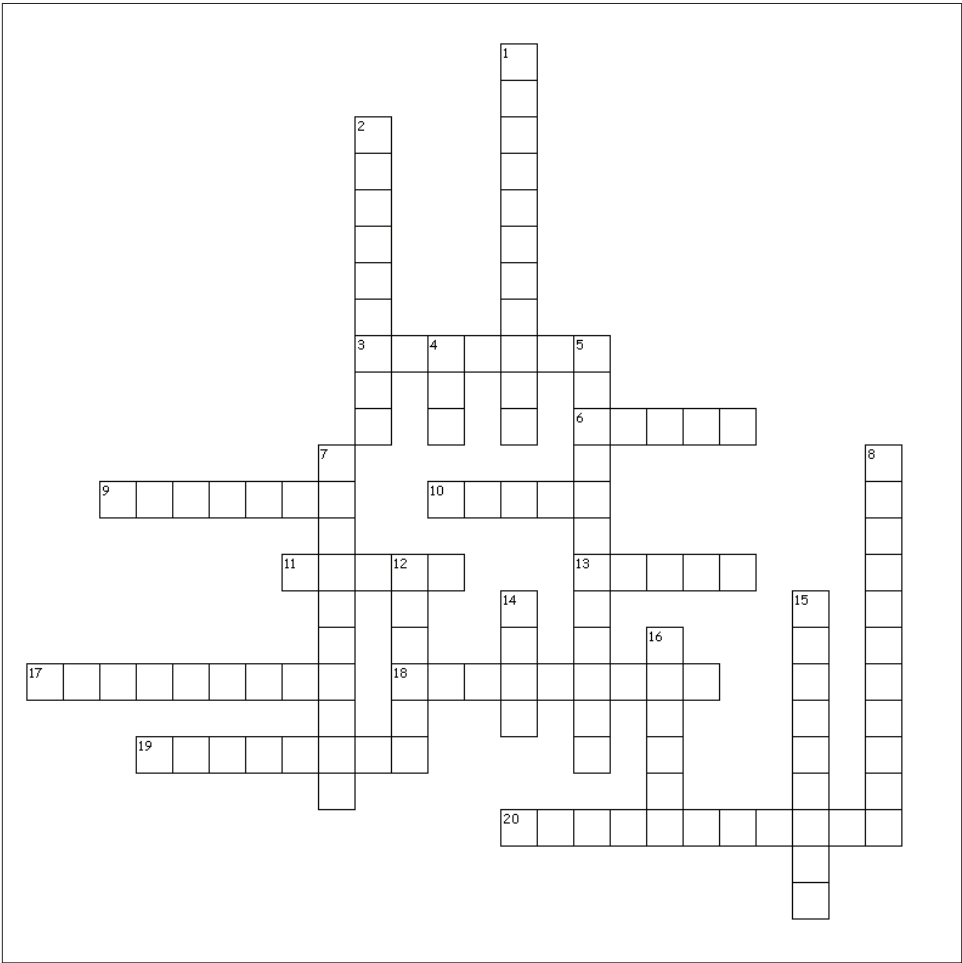

Shuttle busses to all off-site activities leave from the Bus Park area.

- » Pay attention to signs directing you to the various off-site busses.

All off-site activities end at 4 p.m. **YOU must be aware of the shuttle busses picking you up to bring you back to the EAA campground. Busses will pick up until the last Pathfinders are loaded.**

To march in the Oshkosh Sabbath afternoon community parade you must have pre-registered and have a Club Pass to board the busses.
