God's Flashlight


Psalm 119:105 says, "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path." When the psalmist wrote this, he was not thinking about one of those monster lights that could illuminate our future lives for months or years to come. Sometimes we wish for the ability to see what today's choices will mean for our future. Will going to this school be a good thing? What about this new friend, will he or she be a productive relationship or bring pain and problems?

The author was undoubtedly thinking of a small lamp, made of clay, in the shape of a bowl, with some oil and a crude wick. When held in the palm of your hand on a dark night, that kind of lamp would give off just enough light...for the next step.

Donna Hooper, a 91-year-old Master Guide for the Calhoun Cherokees of Georgia, has been involved with Pathfinders for over 35 years.





Cyclist Rides 2,500 miles to Oshkosh

"I always thought it would be neat to ride across the United States," says Josh Wilson, a 23-year old Pathfinder from the Blue Mountain Eagles Pathfinder Club in Oregon. "It was something I've always wanted to do, so I did it."

On June 20, Josh began his 2,500-mile bike ride from Walla Walla, Wash., to Oshkosh, Wis., with thoughts of Camporee in mind. Taking only his gear, a tent, several books and a 50-pound trailer hitched to his bike, Josh was more than prepared for the month-long journey.


"I thought he was crazy!" says Everly Batuik, a family friend and Pathfinder staff. "But I knew he could do it if he put his heart into it. No question."

Each day, Josh would wake up, pack his gear and ride until he found a place to stop for breakfast. After eating, he would continue his trek and bike until evening, sometimes going until it was too dark to see. He averaged 70–100 miles a day, his farthest distance being 125 miles in one day. When it got too dark to continue, Josh would simply pitch his tent near the Interstate, in the woods or behind a tree.

"I camped out pretty much wherever there were no 'no trespassing' signs,"

laughs Josh.

The journey took Josh through
Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming,



When asked what he learned about himself along the trip, Josh jokes, "I learned that I could bike 2,500 miles! But seriously, I've learned to trust God more because there's a ton of stuff that could've happened to me out there but didn't. Sometimes, people would stop by and help me. I remember once, a trucker threw me a water bottle when I needed it. All kinds of neat stuff happened."

Josh had several other experiences that proved God's protection along his trip. While camping near Lake Superior one night, he woke up at 2 a.m. to loud grunting noises outside his tent. He discovered later that campers in the area were having troubles with bears. Other nights, he'd hear wolf packs howling in the woods.

"I just trusted God," says Josh. "I asked Him to keep me safe, and I know that He did."

Josh has been involved with Pathfinders for nearly 15 years. He plans to attend the next Oshkosh Camporee and bike there alongside other Pathfinders in his club. Other future plans include attending the University of Washington in the fall to study forestry.







Pathfinders Shoot for 10,000 Scarves

Knitting scarves might seem like an odd thing to do under the August sun, but that's the requirement when you're trying to put together 10,000 of them by the time the 2010 Winter Olympic Games kick off. Scarf Ministry, a project of www.gothedistance.org, a Canadian-based outreach ministry of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, is one outlet during Camporee where Pathfinders can impact the world.

The goal of Scarf Ministry is to put together approximately 10,000 scarves to give away during the Games. Thousands of people will be trafficking the Vancouver area and Scarf Ministry seeks to minister to as many as possible with a homemade scarf. Brian Wahl, youth director for the British Columbia Conference, says, "The goal has been presented to Pathfinders and







the Church to bring as many scarves as possible to Oshkosh." He also states, "We are also looking for knitters at Camporee to take the patch and tag to sew them onto the scarves donated."

The patch refers to a designed snowflake logo featuring five colors representing different components of God's gift of salvation. The logo is known as "The More Than Gold Snowflake." The patch will be attached to the donated scarves along with a tag reading, "from your friends the Seventh-day Adventists." Wahl says the design will "provide for an opportunity to share the gospel as described symbolically with the colors of the snowflake on the red scarves or bands on the black scarves."

He says to date the gathering and creation of the scarves has been assisted by over 50 Pathfinder clubs and several

other ministry groups. Scarf Ministry is leaning on the help of as many Pathfinders and volunteers as possible to help stitch the patches to the scarves.

Pathfinder assistance during Camporee will provide a huge thrust for the ministry, and the website also provides information for those wanting to knit or donate a scarf after the Camporee. Scarves will be collected until January 31, 2010. Those wanting to contribute can download the scarf pattern at www.gothedistance.com.
